Our first Iowans for Adoption banquet was a huge success! Hosted at Glen Oaks Country Club in West Des Moines, the night started with mingling and posing with the Gingerbread Person. Silent auction tables faced the entrance of the room, filled with various items such as signed ISU athletic supplies, tickets to Disney on Ice, a baking supply basket and a basket of wine bottles with chocolate. In celebration of the fall season, we decorated the tables and hallway with pumpkins, leaves, candles and orange ribbon.

Bill Pearce, VP of Iowans for Adoption, started the banquet with a brief summary of our hard work so far and introduced our first guest speaker, Myron Linn. Linn discussed his family's adoption story.

Erin Kiernan spoke next. Kiernan, who is an honorary board member for Iowans for Adoption, shared her powerful, emotional story to all those who attended. Kiernan became pregnant during high school and decided to place her son for adoption. Years later, she married and started experiencing a period of infertility. She went through many months of medication and hormone injections. Kiernan and her husband considered adoption during this stressful time. Finally, she found out she was pregnant with a son, Michael Francis. She calls him her miracle child. To this day, she advocates for adoption and continues to share her struggle of infertility. No matter how hard her situation, she never gave up. Lastly, Rusty Johnson shared his difficult journey through foster care. He connected with his biological mother, who in return gave him a saxophone. Rusty recently connected with a previous foster parent, Ms. Carolyn Brickley. Brickley, an elementary school music teacher, showed Rusty the ropes of music and how to play the saxophone. To this day, he advocates for child welfare. This past July on his 37th birthday, Brickley adopted Johnson. During the banquet, Rusty and Carolyn played "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" together for the first time.

Overall, we made \$4,000 in donations. Successful Fifth Annual Gingerbread Run/Walk

In celebration of National Adoption Month, runners and walkers across Iowa gathered at Ankeny DMACC for our fifth annual 5K Gingerbread Run/Walk.

Registration began around 9:30 a.m., followed by the youth gingerbread chase at 10 a.m. The actual run/walk began at 10:30 a.m. Around 250 participants signed up for the race. In total, we raised almost \$2,000. The money raised will be given to families who want to adopt a child but don't have the means to do so, as the process can be expensive. To our surprise, we found a family to be the recipient of the first Iowans for Adoption grant of \$5,000 during the event.

In light of the recent deaths of Natalie Finn and Sabrina Ray, the run not only celebrated adoption, but also highlighted the need for quality foster and adoptive parents. Finn and Ray died in the hands of their adoptive parents. In Iowa, there are more than 800 children waiting to be adopted from foster care.

Gingerbread Skate for Adoption Story



"It's the only thing that keeps me going," he says, as he contemplates when he will be able to hit the ice next. Staff Sergeant Luke Vance, a combat soldier in the US Army Reserves, has found healing in the sport of hockey and hopes to inspire others, promote awareness for various causes and simply bring people together. Luke has been playing hockey for just over a year, which started when he decided he was going to try his hand at pick-up hockey, offered at the Ames Ice Arena. Early on, he suffered a fall on the ice that landed him in the hospital for two days, but

that did not deter him in the slightest. Within a few weeks, Luke would be found back on the ice. The next year brought about new friendships and opportunities, culminating in his current endeavors to provide a space to bring other hockey novices together.

Luke won't share much about his 12-month deployment in Iraq, but will admit to the post-traumatic stress he endured. In the immediate aftermath, Luke became consumed by video games and heavy drinking. He had very few, if any, friends and found camaraderie primarily in the safety of his Army unit. There is mutual understanding and empathy among battle buddies. A fellow service member and friend to Luke was involved in hockey himself and was instrumental in peaking Luke's interest in the sport. Ultimately, Luke has found healing through hockey in many ways; a positive outlet for releasing pent up emotion and a sense of self for which he has always been searching. Luke is continuously thinking of ways to utilize hockey for good. He has chosen to support



Iowans for Adoption because of the personal impact adoption has had in his life.



As a transracial adoptee, Luke grew up in rural Iowa and has limited knowledge of his birth parents. He has wrestled with his identity all his life and one day hopes to find more answers to the questions that linger. Luke desires to bring awareness to the multi-faceted issue of adoption, and having been familiar with the Gingerbread Run, he began to ponder, "What about a Gingerbread Skate?" It didn't take long before the planning was underway. The first Gingerbread Skate for Adoption was held on July 15, 2017 and overall, they gathered \$300 in donations. Luke hopes to coordinate another Gingerbread Skate event in 2018.

Bill Pearce Vice President

Bill Pearce is the co-director of Adoption Associates of Iowa and is certified as an Iowa Adoptions Investigator. Adopted by his stepfather at the age of 15, Pearce began to support adoption at a young age. He held numerous professional seminars on child development, juvenile justice, family dynamics and adoption issues. Pearce earned his B.A. and M.A. in Sociology at Drake University. He has been married for 56 years and has two children and three grandchildren. Pearce worked in Juvenile Court for 25 years and served as the Iowa Court System unofficial lobbyist. He freelanced as a writer, investigated contested custody cases, managed a psychiatric clinic and now owns a secular, adoption agency. He is the co-author of Scruffy Shares a Secret, an illustrated storybook about young children of alcoholics and the co-author of *Tough-Minded Parenting*. Pearce has an understanding of individuals with problems, families as systems, formal organizations, budgets, policy and law.



Diana Lang Baltimore President

As the founder and executive director of The National Center for Adoption, Diana Lang Baltimore hopes to educate others about adoption terminology, the adoption processes and the positive aspects of adoption that can enhance the well-being of children and families. Adopted at birth, Baltimore is in reunion with her birth family members. Her birth father was also adopted. She is a proud mom of two children-Blake and Danielle. After his mother's death in 1994, Johnson used music and his saxophone to ease his childhood struggles. In 2006, he combined music and advocacy to create "Rusty Johnson's American Dreams" tour. His child welfare advocacy has received national recognition and awards. This past July on his birthday, he was adopted by Ms. Carolyn Brickley.
